SETTING THE STAGE

ONE TO ONE's province-wide programming leverages the power of one-to-one connections to help children develop literacy skills and reading confidence. We are excited to share the impact that we made in 2024-2025.

We offer three distinct programs:

- In-person tutoring at elementary schools across the province;
- Virtual tutoring offered to students after school; and
- Parent and caregiver reading workshops.

Did you know? Over the *last* school year we piloted a science of reading informed curriculum-update at a handful of test schools. Early results were encouraging. *This* school year we will be significantly increasing our in-person Parent Reading Workshop offerings.

Whether through enhancements to our tutoring program or through increased support for families, we are aways looking to make a greater impact. ONE TO ONE staff strive to stay abreast of the most current and effective literacy practices to set the stage for continual program enhancements.

VOLUNTEERS MAKE WAVES



We are so thankful for the **515 volunteers** who gifted **over 23,000 hours** as literacy tutors this past year.

The theme for National Volunteer Week 2025 was "Volunteers Make Waves," highlighting both the power of a volunteer's dedication and the impact of their efforts. That ripple effect is evident in our students' literacy development.

By the end of the school year, volunteers reported that **89%** of their students seemed excited to read and **88%** felt confident when reading.

My main purpose is to get my readers to enjoy reading. Of course, we work on decoding and comprehension, [but] I feel that what I can add is something they don't always have the luxury of [in class]: one-on-one time and individual attention.

In finding ways to engage with what we're reading and enjoying the stories and the characters [together], time and again my readers end up reading material they never thought possible - not only because of the skills they learn, but because they want to.

I think this is the real value of ONE TO ONE.



Our above-sector-average **66% retention rate** is a testament to the meaningful and lasting connections built through our programs.

When surveyed, 88% of volunteers reported feeling connected through regular events and training opportunities. This is what we see every day: a dedicated network of individuals who believe in the power of literacy and the strength of our shared mission.






SUPPORTING FAMILIES AT HOME

In 2024-25, ONE TO ONE hosted 14 Parent Reading Workshops, serving 280 families. This included 11 in-person workshops, delivered at partner schools in the Lower Mainland and Victoria, and 3 virtual workshops to allow families from across the province to participate.

Designed for parents and caregivers of students in Grades 1-2 our Parent Reading Workshops offer positive reading strategies to support athome reading.



In 2025-26, we will significantly increase our workshop offerings in the Lower Mainland through the generous support of the Simon K.Y. Lee Foundation.

IN-PERSON VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR - SUZANNE MOGAN

Suzanne was instrumental in the startup of the ONE TO ONE program at Tecumseh Elementary School in Vancouver, in 2008 as a member of staff at the school. Now retired, Suzanne reads as a ONE TO ONE volunteer tutor. Amy Rodrigues, school coordinator at Tecumseh, shared:



Week after week you commit your time, energy and kindness working with some of our most vulnerable learners. You share the joy of conversation; you get to know [students] and you try and hook them into developing a love of reading by knowing exactly which books will pique their interests.

[Suzanne:] You play such an important part in developing our students' literacy skills [and] confidence. You encourage risk-taking and most importantly you listen, care, and make learning fun.

VIRTUAL VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR - KAMY ZARGARPOUR

Our very first Virtual Volunteer of the Year, Kamy Zargarpour, started tutoring (in-person) in 2014. When we launched our virtual program 5 years ago, Kamy bravely signed up. This is what Kamy's nominating student's family had to say about reading with him:

Kamy has a gift. He is genuinely interested — not just in reading, but in [our son] as a person. [His] enthusiasm is contagious. He asks thoughtful questions and genuinely listens when [our son] gets curious about a word or idea. [Our son] has gone from avoiding books to picking up graphic novels on his own.

Kamy: you've made a lasting impact on our lives. You've given [our son] the gift of confidence, and that's something that will stay with him forever.



MISSION MOMENT SPOTLIGHT

In our mission moment spotlight, allow us to share a heartwarming volunteer story.

Sydney Spraggs joined our volunteer team in 2023.

After retiring from a career dedicated to supporting students who faced barriers to learning, becoming a ONE TO ONE tutor was a natural next step. "When I came to Vancouver, I thought I would love to work with students who needed reading help. I saw ONE TO ONE [and] thought that would be perfect for me."

Living with multiple sclerosis meant inperson tutoring would be a challenge, so Sydney joined our virtual program.


Simply put, "it has been such a rewarding experience for me," Sydney said.


FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT
